## Invasive non-native species ID Series Quagga Mussel



The Quagga Mussel is a Ponto-Caspian species that poses a significant risk to ecosystems and infrastructure where it colonises. It is a freshwater species but is capable of living in brackish water too, where it will attach to anything solid.

As a filter feeder, in large numbers it has the ability to filter huge quantities of nutrients from water bodies, taking this resources away from native species. It can also cause problems to infrastructure through clogging pipes, fouling hulls and other structures.


Quagga Mussel. Known from a small area in west London but is considered highly likely to spread.


Very similar to another invasive mussel, the Zebra Mussel, but can be separated on a few key points (see pictures)

At cross section, is more rounded and has a deep keel

Can show an obvious central stripe vs zigzag pattern on Zebra Mussel

Has an undulating seam and small basal groove vs straight seem and large basal groove on Zebra Mussel
